Course Description

The course aims to provide a comprehensive understanding of emerging security challenges arising from a rapidly changing global environment to familiarize students with main themes in security studies, with special emphasis on India's security policy and interests.

The course begins with a broad overview of global security issues, including conventional and non-conventional challenges and includes security challenges faced by India with special focus on policies and decision-making. The course is complemented by specific case studies with interactive sessions with students thus providing a solid grounding on concepts and their practical application which are useful in a variety of situations.

1. Analyze critically the emerging security challenges and the concomitant policy responses.
2. Examine the role and responsibility of various stakeholders.
3. Explore alternative options for better policy preparedness to deal with new emerging threats in the long term.

Terrorism, piracy, organized crime, climate change, energy security, new technology; cyber and space, AI, autonomous weapons, drones, migration, and demographics, deglobalization -economic war and sanctions; pandemics; regional and international response.

Borders, extremism and terrorism, narcotics, fake currency, insurgencies, pandemics and health security, migration, and refugees; India's policy and institutional response. Regional and international dimensions.
